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Greece opens borders for Bulgarian and Romanian workers

The Greek government informed the European Commission that Greece has decided to lift the barriers for Bulgarian and Romanian workers that were put in place when the two countries joined the EU two years ago. Thus, from January 1st, 2009 Bulgarians and Romanians will be able to move to and work in Greece without any restriction. The Ministry of Employment claims that this decision will help curb uninsured labor and will not result in a massive influx of workers from these countries (*Eleftheros Typos*, 31/12/2008).

It should be noted that other EU countries such as Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg have opted not to open their borders for Bulgarian and Romanian workers because of the economic crisis and rising unemployment (*EUObserver.com*, 5/12/2008). Other countries such as Britain have set a quota on the number of unskilled Bulgarians and Romanians that they will allow in the country. Britain's annual quota is 21,250 from this April (*The Guardian*, 19/12/2008).

The Greek government had the right to retain the restrictions for Bulgarian and Romanian workers for five more years in order to protect the country's labor market.

Arrests for illegal entry by sea jump by 66%

According to the latest figures released by the Greek Port Police (*Eleftherotypia*, *8/1/2009*), 15,315 illegal immigrants were arrested in 2008 for attempting to enter the country by sea. This sets a new record which exceeds by 66% the previous one of 2007. The figures presented in the table above show that, in the past two years, arrests for illegal entry by sea have risen tremendously. It should be noted that, despite this increase, nine out of ten arrests for illegal entry or illegal stay in Greece originate from the country's land borders.

A significant increase should also be expected in the nationwide numbers of those arrested for illegal entry and illegal stay as, according to Ministry of Interior data, in the first nine months of 2008 146,377 illegal immigrants had been arrested (*Kathimerini 15/1/2009*), compared to 112,364 in the 12 months of 2007.
