



RIEAS Notes for Authors

Papers submitted to the Research Institute for European and American Studies (RIEAS) should be original contributions and should not be derived from existing or planned publications. We do not accept double submissions. The submitted manuscript should not be under consideration for any other publication at the same time.

All submissions should be emailed as a word attachment to the director, Dr. John Nomikos (rieasinfo@gmail.com). We always acknowledge receipt. All manuscripts will be refereed and only those receiving favourable recommendations will be accepted for publication. Some manuscripts are dealt with by the RIEAS scholars, but most are read by outside referees.

The standard word length for the RIEAS Research Paper is about 5,000 words (including abstract, endnotes and references). The cover page should include the title of the paper, name(s) and affiliation(s) of the author(s), a short abstract of around 200 words, which should describe the main arguments and conclusions of the article and a short bibliographical statement. All notes should be numbered sequentially and appear as endnotes not footnotes. Notes in text should be referred to in the text by superscript numbers, 1, 2, 3 etc. Provide the note text as a list at the end of the article before the references.

Manuscript Style Guidelines

Submitted manuscripts should be in the following format:

Font: Times New Roman

Font size: 12

Line spacing: Single

Alignment: Justified

Page numbers: Top of the page, to the right

No space between paragraphs.

Don't use headers or footers.

Non-English words should be *italicized*.

References in the text

References should be cited in the text in by giving the last name of the author(s) followed by the year of publication in parenthesis, e.g. (Gray, 2001), when referring to a particular page (Gray, 2001, p.16), when referring to more than one publications (Brown, 1999; Freedman, 2003; Waltzer, 2006). Publications by the same author(s) in the same year should be identified with a, b, c (e.g. 1974a, 1990b) closed up to the year. If there are two authors for a publication, put both names separated by '&', e.g. (Booth & Smith, 1989). If there are more than two authors, put the name of the first author followed by et al (Garnett *et al.*, 1994).

List of References

References are placed in alphabetical order of authors. References should include all author's names and initials, year of publication, title of article or book, the full title of the journal, volume and page numbers, and for books and other documents, the publisher's name and place of publication e.g.
